AT THE LAKE.

Breezy Point as Improved by a Club of Gentlemen from This City.

BREEZY POINT.

The party of gentlemen, consisting of Geo.
H. Morrison, Chas. B. Eastis, Geo. Libby, J.
H. Elliott and Henry B. Whitmore, who pur-
chased a site for a cottage on Spirit Knob,
have about completed the principal part of
their improvements, and occupied the cottage
for the first time on yesterday. They have
rechristened the point, and will call
it by the above name. They have
built by far the prettiest cottage on the lake,
painted its exterior and roof tastily, and will
surround it with attractive grounds. The cot-
tage is gothic in architecture and located on
the first point out from Wayzata, and near
Woolsey's and Mr. S. G. Gale's cottage. It has
wide verandas, a spacious sitting and dining
room in one corner of which is a
great brick fire place. In the rear
are a kitchen and arrangements for
maintaining the domestic department in a
manner such as might be expected of the New
England epicures who own the property. Up
stairs there are five rooms besides a large
closet, and there are two comfortable and spa-
cious sleeping rooms down stairs. The inside

wood work is finished in oil and varnished,
the windows covered with wire screens and
inside blinds. A barn for six head of horses,
and a large boat and bath house have also
been built, and a substantial dock secured with
thirty ton of rock, moored in the lake. Mr.
Whitmore has had built under his especial di-
rection, a bean oven, and will maintain, "de-
spite all temptation," the old New England cus-
tom of baked beans for Sunday morning break-
fast. There are other improvements in progress
on "Breezy Point," but enough has been done
already to make the proprietors envied by their
friends.

C. B. Eustis Elected Commodore—A Big Yacht Race Proposed for Convention Time.

The annual meeting of the Minnetonka Yacht Club at the West Hotel last evening was not a particularly exciting event, although there was a fairly large attendance and the utmost interest was manifested in the election. C. B. Eustis was made commodore in place of H. J. Burton, in spite of his earnest protests that he did not want the place. H. B. Hurd was unanimously elected vice-commodore, and Cavour Langdon, T. B. Janney, E. J. Phelps, William Peet, Carman N. Smith, H. J. Burton and George Morse were selected as directors.
